## Pool owns Miss Basketball

Injury halted winner's season at only 13 games

As Tabitha Pool lay on the basketball floor writhing in pain last month, she thought it was over.

A college scholarship? Over. A state championship? Over. Miss Basketball? Over.

"I didn't think any of the coaches would vote for me after this," she said, glancing down at her right knee, which required surgery to repair a torn anterior cruciate ligament.

Pool's senior season was finished after only 13 games, but it didn't make a difference to members of the Basketball Coaches Association of Michigan.

Pool, from Ann Arbor Huron, became the 20th winner of the

Miss Basketball Award on Monday. She accepted the trophy while on crutches.

Miss Basketball is the most prestigious honor a female high school athlete in Michigan can receive. The award is given annually to the state's top senior by the coaches association, in conjunction with the Free Press.

In voting by association members, Pool accumulated 400 points, followed by Kristin Haynie of Mason with 297 and Katie Feenstra of Grand Rapids Baptist with 279. Points are awarded on a 5-3-1 basis.

Although her season was limited, Pool, 6-feet-1, made the most of it. She averaged 21.6 points, 17.1 rebounds, 3.0 assists and 6.0 steals.

But the most telling statistic had nothing to do with the number of points she scored or rebounds she grabbed. In a story profiling the 11 Miss Basketball finalists, five named Pool the best player they had ever played against.

"I thought that was a nice thing for them to say," Pool said.

They were simply stating the obvious. Pool is a tough opponent, and no one knows that better than her brother, Rufus, a junior at Ann Arbor Huron.

The two of them honed their skills on the outdoor courts at nearby Ellsworth Park. The courts are lighted, and they spent hours playing with and against each other.

"It took me a few years before I could beat her," said Rufus, a member of Huron's varsity team. "Her best move is her behind-herback move. I can't stop that, but a

lot of people can't stop it."

Pool is the state's first Miss

Basketball not to complete her senior season, and she is the first to sign with Michigan. Her injury occurred before she signed a national letter of intent, and she needed assurances from U-M coach Sue Guevara that her offer was still on the table.

"When I got hurt I thought I wouldn't be able to get into a university," Pool said. "I called Sue that same day and she told me she still wanted me. That made me happy."

There isn't a school in the country that wouldn't take a risk on Pool, healthy or otherwise. National power Tennessee put the full-court press on her through the summer and early fall but couldn't convince Pool to leave Ann Arbor.

In addition to her obvious talents on the floor, coaches appreciated her concern for her team.

"How many kids do you know would score 30 points and get 25 rebounds and be crying because we lost by one point?" Huron

"I had heard of Mr. Basketball but I hadn't heard of Miss Basketball for some reason," she said. "The first one I remember was Kristen Koetsier, two years ago. When Vicki won it last year, I thought I might have a chance."

Despite being ranked No. 1 in the preseason ratings, Pool thought her chances slipped away when she underwent surgery earlier this month. She was surprised and pleased Sunday afternoon when she learned she had won the

award.

"I haven't been able to sleep well since the surgery," Pool said.
"The pain wakes me up all of the time. I didn't sleep well last night either, but it was because I was so nervous and excited about this award."
