

council and a member of the National Honor Society and Students Against Destructive Decisions, was dumbfounded when she was told she had won.

"A lot of my goals are geared toward the team and winning and individual improvement," she said. "I just thought it would be someone else."

But Clement, a 5-foot-9 guard, has been front and center her entire four-year career. As a freshman she scored 16 points, grabbed 10 rebounds and made four assists and four steals in the Class C state championship game, which St. Ignace won.

As a sophomore she led St. Ignace to the semifinals, and last year the Saints advanced to the

championship game.

This season she averaged 24 points, 6.7 rebounds, 7.4 assists and 4.2 steals before St. Ignace lost in overtime to Ishpeming Westwood in the regional final.

For her career, Clement scored 2,060 points, and St. Ignace posted a 99-5 record. She has not chosen a college, but is considering Duke, Northern Michigan, Marquette and Indi-

ana, among others.

During her acceptance speech, Clement became emotional when she thanked her coaches, Dorene and Doug Ingalls, as well as her parents, Diggy and Scott. She also thanked the school officials and her teammates who made the trip to the Free Press from the foot of the Mackinac Bridge.

"We had three carloads of people make a five-hour trip just to see me accept this, eat some sandwiches and then get back in the car and drive five hours back," she said. "I've had great support. I had the easy job. The only thing I did was play the game

Playing basketball was easy because Clement had excellent role models. Among them were four St. Ignace players now at Lake Superior State — her brother Jimmy and his friend Steve

MacDonald, and sisters Randi and Mandi Johnson.

"We played in the summer all the time," Clement said. "And it was not just goofing around taking crazy shots. We'd take good shots and get lots of things done and work hard.

"I remember being in the seventh grade and instead of going to a New Year's Eye party my dad opened the gym and we played basketball. My dad brought pop and candy to the gym, and that's how we brought in the new year — playing basketball."

Clement seemed most pleased to win the award because of what it will mean to St. Ignace and the

UP in general.

"If you could see the way our community loves basketball," she said with a twinkle in her eye. "It's more than just a high school program. I was in the gym a couple of days after we lost, and there were these little girls in there playing and you see it in their eyes that they loved playing, they want to win a state championship someday.

"Maybe me winning this will tell people: 'We're good up here.'"

Clement became aware of the award when she was in the eighth grade and accompanied the Saints to Mt. Pleasant for the state semifinals and finals. Vicki Krapohl of Mt. Pleasant had been named Miss Basketball that week.

"We were in Fazoli's, and somebody said that was Vicki Krapohl and she was Miss Basketball," Clement said. "I was so impressed I couldn't say a thing. I thought that would be the coolest thing in the world. I thought: 'Wow! She's special.'"

Now Krista Clement is special.
