2004-05 MISS BASKETBALL AWARD WINNER: TIFFANIE SHIVES

Tiffanie Shives was about to enter high school at Lansing Christian when her parents began receiving warnings from friends and coaches. The questions remained until the parents talked to Michigan State coach Joanne P. McCallie. "Tiffanie went to Michigan State's elite camp between eighth and ninth grade, and Coach McCallie addressed that," said her mother, Trudy. "Coach said if she was good enough, college coaches would find her." Not only did college coaches find Shives, so did other high school coaches, who elected her the 24th recipient of the Miss Basketball Award, which was presented Monday at the Free Press.


Shives became the first Miss Basketball from a Class D school since Julie Polakowski of Leland won the initial award in 1981. And like Polakowski, Shives is headed to MSU. Playing at a school with an enrollment of about 200 certainly didn't hurt Shives, who easily outdistanced the field. She received 110 of the 274 first-place votes and received 680 points. St. Johns' Jenny Poff, who also signed with MSU, was second with 434 points, and Carney-Nadeau's Carly Benson, who signed with Michigan, was third with 269. .

Shives, a 5-foot-10 guard, is averaging 25.1 points heading into tonight's state quarterfinal against St. Joseph Michigan Lutheran. She holds the state record with 300 career three-point baskets, and she has scored 2,176 career points.

A player's accomplishments before her senior year often determine someone's candidacy for the Miss Basketball Award, and Shives had an outstanding junior season while leading Lansing Christian to the Class D state championship. She scored 32 points and hit nine of 16 three-point shots in a 66-33 semifinal victory over Rapid River, then scored 36 points and was 7-for-14 from three-point range in a 56-42 victory over defending champ Portland St. Patrick in the finals.

Last summer, Shives proved she belonged at the top of her class. She narrowly missed making the junior national team. "This is such a great honor because it means a Class D player can be the same caliber as a Class A player," Shives said. "It's about who knows you and if they have seen you. When I found out I was the front-runner I thought: 'Oh, great, more pressure.' But that's OK because I like pressure."
