ASSISTANT COACH * JIM CONLEY Royal Oak High School

Dedication and loyalty are two traits that successful basketball programs look for in its coaches. Jim Conley, a junior high/middle school coach and athletic director, is a great example of these traits for the Royal Oak Public Schools.

Jim spent some 34 years, 1966-2000, coaching basketball as well as football, track, volleyball and wrestling. His basketball career spanned 33 years



coaching in 744 total games that resulted in an impressive 598-146 won-loss record. Over his 34-year career, Jim coached in 1,349 total games in all sports compiling a record of 1140-209, which equated to an incredible won-loss 82%. For these accomplishments Jim was named Michigan Coach of the Year, Regional Coach of the Year and National Coach of the Year by the National Federation of High Schools. In 2003, Jim was elected to the Michigan Coaches Hall of Fame.

In addition to his coaching accomplishments, Jim has been a registered MHSAA Official since 1972 in football, basketball, track, cross country, volleyball and wrestling. He served as Little Oak League Coordinator for 28 years while still finding time to volunteer for Special Olympics and Habitat for Humanity.

Jim is married to wife, Ardyce.

ASSISTANT COACH * DeWAYNE SMITH River Rouge High School

The NBA has the Los Angeles Lakers and the Boston Celtics. The NCAA has UCLA. What do these teams have in common? They win championships consistently. River Rouge High School also was a basketball dynasty. DeWayne A. Smith was a player and coach for many of River Rouges' championships.

Coach Smith played on legendary coach Lofton

Green's first state championship team After graduating from Bowling Green University where he played basketball and tennis he returned to River Rouge to assist Coach Greene for 23 years. During his tenure as an assistant coach, River Rouge won nine state Class B championships. Coach Smith also coached the JV team compiling a record of 368 wins and only 92 losses. He coached River Rouge as the Varsity coach from 1984-1994.

Coach Smith was inducted into the High School Coaches Association in 1996 and served as president of the Michigan Sport Sages in 1996. DeWayne is also very active in his community serving on the Wayne County Library Commission and Allen Park Library Commission. DeWayne and wife Shirley have one child.

OFFICIAL * KEN "Cornish" SUDALL * Lansing

Successful officials have a love for the game, work hard and combine their duties with being a teacher to many young men and women at the same time. For the past 30 years, Ken "Cornish" Sudall exemplifies a successful official.

Ken's passion for basketball began as a player at West Catholic High School in Philadelphia and he continued playing at Millersville University from 1960-1964.



Soon after college he began his officiating career and quickly established himself as one of the best in his profession. After working the Pennsylvania State Finals in 1968, he was named "Official of the Year" in Pennsylvania. After moving to Michigan, Ken picked up where he left off and officiated the Michigan State Finals in 1982 and again in 1988.

With his expertise, Ken is seen as a leader of officiating around the Lansing area as well as the state. "Cornish" served as the first supervisor of officials in the Lansing Metro area in 1988 - present and is the pioneer of the three person officiating in the Lansing area. He founded "Camp Cornish", the only non-profit officials camp, dedicated to new officials using high school only rules and mechanics.

"Cornish" received the 20-year MHSAA Award in 1996. He has served as a Big Ten observer of officials for the past 14 years and is currently a WNBA

observer of officials.

Ken's family includes his wife Sharon, sons Kevin, Eric and Patrick and daughters Kellie and Kim.

OFFICIAL * BOB WILLIAMS * Redford

Officials combine hard work and their love of the game to help teach young men and women how to be successful. Bob Williams is an official who has put these traits to work at the highest level for the past 33 years. Since 1970, Bob has been an active official at both the high school and college level.

Bob's leadership and love for teaching younger officials can be seen in the many clinics he has been a part of. Beginning in 1977, Bob served as the Director of Metro Detroit Basketball Officiating Clinic until 1984. He then took over as President of the Metro



Athletic Officials Association until 2001. Since 2001, he has served as treasurer and secretary of the Metro Detroit Officials Association. Beginning in 1999 Bob served as a clinician at both the Basketball Officiating Camp at Oakland University and the Great Midwest Officiating Camp in Indiana. His leadership continues to this day, as he is a charter member of the Basketball Officials Coaches Communication Committee along with BCAM's Tom Hursey.

He covered tournament basketball games in 1977 before taking over full time play-by-play duties in 1978. Since 1978, the 23 Greater Muskegon football teams that have played in the state football finals have been proud to call Jim their announcer as well as the nine teams that he announced games for in the basketball state championships.

Moyes and his long time partner, Gene Young, were selected to broadcast the state basketball finals for the 2001 and 2002 State Championships on the MHSAA Basketball network. Jim has been a broadcaster for 36 years.
