## William Lowery

William Lowery attended Grosse Ile High School from 1954-58 participating in football, basketball, baseball, and track. While playing basketball, he earned three varsity letters under the guidance of one of the Hall of Famers, Coach Glen Bagnall. William then attended Eastern Michigan University where he participated and lettered in basketball and track and received his degree in Physical Education.

From 1963-65, William taught Physical Educatin and Health at Romulus Jr. High. At that time, he also coached ninth grade basketball. The next two years were spent in the Plymouth School System teaching Elementary Physical Education. In 1967, William began his teaching and coaching career in the Grosse Ile Township School System. As a coach, he worked under the tutelage of Glen Bagnall. Lowery was his assistant and served as Jr. Varisy Coach for 17 years. An overview of his coaching career record in basketball is 114 losses and 196 wins. since 1985, William Lowery has been the Athletic Director at the Grosse Ile Middle and High Schools.




### **Donald Smith**

Donald Smith graduated from Dearborn Fordson High School in January 1950. He went on to earn a Bachelors Degree in Industrial Arts, in 1954, from Michigan State Normal College (E.M.U.). Donald also received a Masters Degree in Education from Wayne State University in 1974.

Donald began teaching and coaching at the Capac Community Schools in 1954. Since that time, he has taught shop, mechanical drawing, physical education, math, drivers education, and has even driven a school bus.

He has coached, football, basketball (boys and girls), baseball, track, cross country, and has won league championships in baseball, Jr. High football and Jr. High basketball. In 1956, Donald began coaching Jr. High boys basketball. During that time, he has won 537 games and lost 181 games. This includes 24 tournament championships and had 14 teams go undefeated.



Mick McCabe.


Mick McCabe, 44 years of age, played basketball at Allen Park Cabrini and Mercy College of Detroit. Later he became the school's sports information director.

Mick started at the Free Press on June 3, 1970. He began helping Hal (Swami) Schram by covering games and quickly began selecting All-Catholic, All-PSL, All-Suburban and All-Metro teams. Eventually Mick took over the All-State team, too.

He has covered every presentation of the Hal Schram Mr. Basketball Award, and now coordinates the ceremony with B.C.A.M. and the Free Press. Every major TV and radio station in Detroit now cover the event. Mick also coordinates the presentation of the Miss Basketball award with B.C.A.M., the Lansing State Journal and the Free Press and has brought state-wide exposure to the event.

Mick has helped conceive the High Exposure Basketball Camp and later the Michigan All-State Girls Basketball Camp. He was the state's first sports writer to cover girls basketball. He was the first writer to select an All-State girls basketball team, and also became the first writer to have state-wide weekly rankings.

Mick my well be best known as the Son of Swami for his predictions during the boys and girls state tournament. He is known to occassionally make a correct prediction.



Bernie Kennedy\_

Bernie Kennedy is observing his 25th year as a sports writer for "The Macomb Daily" in Mount Clemens. The U.S. Army veteran and former sports editor for the Detroit Bureau of The Associated Press joined The Daily staff in February 1969.

Since joining the staff of The Macomb Daily, Kennedy has compiled game-by-game results lists for every Macomb County High School boys basketball and football team. His records now reach back more than 25 years and encompass a list of county schools that has grown to more than 30. Each year Kennedy publishes a list of Macomb County schools and their records for 5-, 10-, 15-, 20-, and 25-year periods. He also has tracked coaching changes and post-season tournament results for every county team. In addition to covering the spectrum of high school sports, Kennedy's duties with "The Macomb Daily" include writing a weekly bowling column and frequent coverage of the Detroit Tigers.

Kennedy was inducted into the Greater Detroit Bowling Association Hall of Fame in 1989. He has been a member of the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association. Kennedy graduated from the University of Michigan in 1957 with a degree in journalism. Following graduation from U-M, he worked as sports writer at the "Hillsdale Daily News" then continued his sports-media career as sports editor of "The Rolling Review" while serving in the Army. Kennedy was stationed in Germany for 18 months during his Army tenure.

He also has worked as a sports writer at The Utica Daily Sentinel. Kennedy and his wife, Marie, live in St. Clair Shores.



### Gar Underwood

Gar Underwood has been an official for 20 years. He has officiated both the Boys'and Girls' State Finals, in 1985 and in 1988, respectively. In addition, he has officiated three High School All-Star Games as well as Michigan All-Stars vs. Ohio All-Stars.

Dennis and his wife, Rosemary, have three children.




#### Jim Masser\_\_\_\_

In 29 years, approximately 600 varsity games, Fred has missed only five of them: one for a daughter's wedding, one when he had angioplasty after a heart attack, and three while recuperating from cancer surgery.

He has been married 48 1/2 years to the mother of his ten children. Fred has 18 grandchildren with the 19th due any time.


#### **Art Kiel**
