

The 6-3 Lansing Waverly HS senior, Marcus Taylor, easily won this year's Hal Schram Mr. Basketball Award. Marcus received 932 points based on voting by BCAM members. Second place was Eugene Seals of Saginaw HS.

Mr. Taylor is averaging 27 points, 6.3 rebounds and seven assists as his team enters the final week of the state tournament. The future MSU Spartan has hopes of finishing his high school career with a state championship.

Marcus was selected to play in the McDonald's game as well as the Hoop Summit Game during the Final Four. He made several All-American teams and is in the running for national player of the year. But as he told his parents, "the Mr. Basketball Award is special".

Waverly coach Phil Odlum says, "The coaches couldn't have picked a better person for this award. The nice thing is that if you set goals and work hard, you can attain them. Marcus is living proof of that."

Taylor-made award

Waverly star earns state's top hoop honor

DETROIT (AP) — Marcus Taylor has been compared to Magic Johnson and Michigan State guard Mateen Cleaves for years. Now the Lansing Waverly senior has something that neither of those players does — the Mr. Basketball Award.

Taylor won in a landslide Monday. In voting by the Basketball Coaches Association of Michigan in coniunction with the Detroit Free Press, Taylor received 932 points compared to just 227 points for runner-up Eugene Seals of Saginaw. Maurice Searight of Orchard Lake St. Mary's took third place with 199 points.

It is the 20th anniversary of the award and organizers said they believe it is the largest point differential in

voting history.

"I was very happy," said Taylor, about hearing he had won. "I worked so hard to get to this point and win this award. It just shows all the hard work paid off. My parents are so proud and it's iust been great."

It is Taylor's parents, James and Kay, who have stayed involved in his life and have had the biggest

influence on him.

"He put in a lot of time with me and taught me a lot about the game and about life, what to expect," Taylor said. "We sat down and watched players as I was growing up, seeing all the mistakes they made and all
